#### What is Dual Enrollment?



- Dual enrollment classes are college courses that are taught on Helix's campus.
- Students in grades 10-12 can earn college credit, as well as high school credit.
- Courses are taught by qualified Helix teachers or Grossmont instructors.
- Classes are college level and students will be held to a college-level standard.
- Courses are completely Free (Tuition, Fees, Books)

### What is Concurrent Enrollment?

- Concurrent enrollment classes are college courses that students can take on Grossmont/Cuyamaca's campus.
  - Students may also take online classes.
  - Students earn both college and high school credit for approved courses.
  - ☐ Students are responsible for fees and textbooks/materials (tuition is waived)

# How Many Classes Should My Student Take?

- We advise students take only one course their first semester, regardless of grade level.
- After that, students should consider their course load, time commitment and success level. The following are general guidelines:
  - ☐ First Year: 1 per semester
  - Second Year: 1-2 per semester
  - ☐ Third Year: 2 per semester
  - □ Summer: 1 class (accelerated pace)

### How are Dual/Concurrent Enrollment Classes Different than High School Classes?

- Students will be held to college-level standards and will complete college-level work.
- ☐ The grades students earn will stay on their college transcript FOREVER.
- Parents will NOT have access to grades and cannot email instructors for information. Students must be responsible for all aspects of learning and coursework.

# What are the Advantages of Dual/Concurrent Enrollment?

- ☐ Students earn college credit and high school credit simultaneously.
- □ Dual enrollment classes are FREE and concurrent tuition is paid for.

## What Do We Caution About Dual/Concurrent Enrollment?

- Make sure your student is ready to take on the responsibilitygreat reward, but great responsibility.
  - Instructors will not remind students of their assignments and deadlines. Students must read the syllabus and review it regularly.
- Do not take too many classes, better to take less and have better grades.
- Important to stay on top of deadlines and important dates.

#### Requirements and Process to Enroll

- 1. Students must create an account and submit an application.
- 2. Students must fill out an authorization form and a parent/guardian must sign.
  - New form required <u>EVERY</u> semester
- 3. Concurrent enrollment students must also enroll online on WebAdvisor.

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### What are the Costs of Dual/Concurrent Enrollment Courses?

- Dual enrollment classes are completely FREE (includes tuition, fees, and textbooks)
- Concurrent enrollment classes include free tuition, but families will be responsible for paying for textbooks and any related fees.
