Spring Break is an excellent time to do community service!

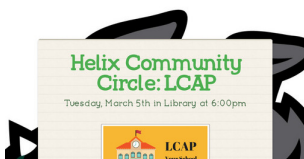
As a graduation requirement, Helix students are required to complete a minimum of 40 community service hours. We encourage students to take advantage of this time off in order to get involved.

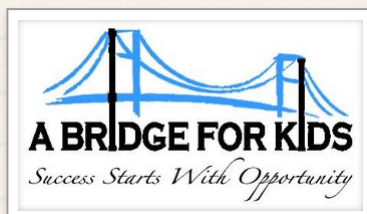


This Month: Try to SOCIALIZE GOODNESS!

A Note about Taking College Classes at Helix

If your student is planning to take a college class on the Helix campus, they will be taking what is known as a *dual enrollment class*. Dual enrollment classes are taught on campus during normal school hours. Additionally, there are no fees for a student taking a dual enrollment class.

If your student is planning to take a class at the college campus or online through the college in the future, they will be taking a *concurrent enrollment class*. In this case, your family may be responsible for the fees. The College Center on Helix's campus can determine whether or not fees may be waived for your student. If your student owes fees and does not pay them, they may not receive college credit for the class and may not be able to register for classes in another semester until those fees are paid.

Devil Pups – Youth Program for America

The Devil Pups Encampment is held annually with the cooperation and support of the United States Marine Corps. Due to their limited facilities and active military training schedule at Marine Corps Base Camp Pendleton (near San Diego). The Marine Corps will only allow Devil Pups, Inc. permission to bring 640 Devil Pups aboard their base to conduct the 10 Day Good Citizenship – Physical Development Program during the month of July each year.



A youth may only graduate from Devil Pups once as we have limited space for the number of qualified applicants we get. We are proud to have graduated 53,176 Pups and counting since 1954.

After all the qualifications have been met, acceptance is on a first-come, first-served basis. Each area is given a specific quota of participants to admit. If you didn't get accepted this year, you are welcome to try again next year, as long as you are still between the ages of 14-17 and meet the rest of the qualifications.

This is Part One of a five-part series about how to support and accommodate middle-schoolers, high-schoolers and adults with dyslexia. I've had many older students confess to me that they would rather be thought of as defiant than stupid. Many students with undiagnosed dyslexia suffer from anxiety. Depending on the severity of their language challenges, the student may opt out of activities to avoid being put on the spot or placed under pressure to perform.
