- Choose your simplest option car = Safe School








Questions

The Truth

- There are over 2200 colleges in the United States and the majority of them do not have waiting lists (only 64/2206 accept fewer than 25% of the students that apply)
- Some colleges are closer by airplane than others are by car

The Truth continued...

- Some colleges have lots of funding to give to students who really want to go to their school because:
 - They have wealthy donors who have created large endowments which allow colleges to use the funds however they want
- What are your criteria?
 - Are you stuck on a name brand?
 - What if the school were 100% free and it were located out of California or in an area you hadn't originally considered?
 - What if you could qualify for a name-brand school, but have to give a decision ahead of time?
 - Is the grass always greener somewhere else?
 - What is the ultimate goal of a college degree?
 - What are the absolutes that you are looking for in a college?
 - Can you rank those absolutes?

Academic Achievement:

- In the top 5% or 10% of their class.
- Have received mostly A's grades in the most rigorous classes available.
- Scored >1250 (Critical Reading +Math) on the SAT or >28 (Composite) on the ACT.

Financial Qualification:

- Household income is less than \$65,000 a year, and often less for a typical family of four, with minimal assets.
- Often eligible for free or reduced-price lunch.

Personal Circumstances:

- Often in the first generation in their family to attend a four-year U.S. college.
- Unusually high level of family responsibility (caring for siblings, part-time work to support family financially, etc.)
- Extracurricular achievements, such as leadership or community activities.

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

2016 National College Match application opens online.

September 27, 2016

National College Match application is due.

October 13, 2016

College rankings due.

October 20, 2016

- · Applicants are notified of Finalist decisions via their application.
- Finalists continue with their College Match applications. Applicants not chosen as Finalists (Non-Finalists) should proceed on their own with college applications.

November 1, 2016

Finalists must submit required documents to the colleges that they have ranked.

November 2, 2016

Final college rankings and Match Agreement Form are due (if needed).

November 7, 2016

Finalists can begin selecting colleges for QuestBridge Regular Decision.

December 1, 2016

- Finalists are notified of College Match results.
- Finalists who do not match continue with QuestBridge Regular Decision.

December 11, 2016

The QuestBridge Regular Decision Form is due.

Spring 2017

Admissions decisions are sent out by the colleges for Regular Decision applicants.
